## Free workshops help marine shoreline and marine bluff landowners protect and manage properties while enhancing salmon habitat

RENTON--King Conservation District (King CD) presents two upcoming workshops on protecting and managing property on marine shorelines and marine bluffs during May and June 2009. Titled “Where the Water Begins – Land Management Practices for Marine Shoreline & Bluff Properties,” these workshops are free.

Scheduled for May 23 and June 6, the workshops are designed to provide information about the natural resource values and risks associated with owning and managing these types of properties. District staff and consultants will be on hand to help landowners solve problems or address concerns about marine shorelines and marine bluffs.

“Where the Water Begins” workshops focus on key issues including how to promote stable natural shorelines, how to reduce the risk of bluff erosion and landslides, and how to improve fish and wildlife habitat. The workshops are important because they offer landowners ideas on how to reduce water pollution and improve habitat for Chinook salmon and other fish and wildlife species.
