King Conservation District announces five candidates for board of supervisor election; on-line voting begins Feb. 15

Introduction of secure, on-line 30-day voting period Feb.15-March 15

RENTON—The King Conservation District (King CD) has announced candidates for the board of supervisor position in advance of the month-long, district-wide public election.

For the first time, the King CD will provide secure, on-line voting as an alternative to in-person balloting. Voting begins February 15 and ends at 9 pm on March 15.

Candidates for the position #2 include Douglas “Bruce” Elliott, Kent; Teri Herrera, Redmond; Eric K. Nelson, Duvall; Steven F. Neugebauer, Duvall; and Preston Prudente of Sammamish.

“We are pleased to have a full slate of candidates for our inaugural on-line election,” said King CD board of supervisors Chairman Bill Knutsen.

The King CD is introducing secure, on-line voting as a convenient alternative to in-person voting. Voters may vote from their home, business or other computer locations. The district will also provide a one-day, in-person voting option at the King CD’s Renton office on March 15 between 9 am to 9 pm. All votes will be tallied at the conclusion of voting.

King CD has retained election supervisor Election Trust LLC (Bellevue) and Scytl Secure Electronic Voting USA (Washington, DC) to manage and conduct the election process.

Individuals registered to vote in King County (excluding residents of cities that are not members of the King Conservation District: Enumclaw, Federal Way, Milton, Pacific and Skykomish) are eligible to vote. On-line voters will be required to complete a two-step process: submitting a signed affidavit to confirm voting eligibility; then voting using a Personal Identification Number (PIN) issued by Election Trust.

The King CD has initiated the online voting alternative following the November, 2010 revisions in rules governing conservation district elections in Washington State. Elections for the King Conservation District and the other 46 conservation districts in Washington State are conducted pursuant to guidelines established by RCW 89.08 with oversight from the Washington State

Conservation Commission, an agency created to assist and guide conservation district activities in Washington State.

King CD board members serve voluntary, three-year terms

The all-volunteer, five-member board includes three elected members and two who are appointed by the Washington State Conservation Commission. All supervisors serve three-year terms. As public officials, their responsibility is to ensure that the King CD meets its legal and public trust obligations. The board of supervisors conducts regular public meetings to oversee the district's budget and provide policy guidance and oversight to district staff.

Supervisors are expected to help identify critical resource conservation needs in their district, communicate with the public and seek feedback about conservation programs from district residents.
